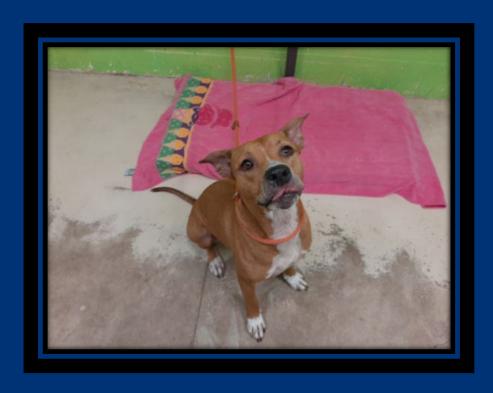

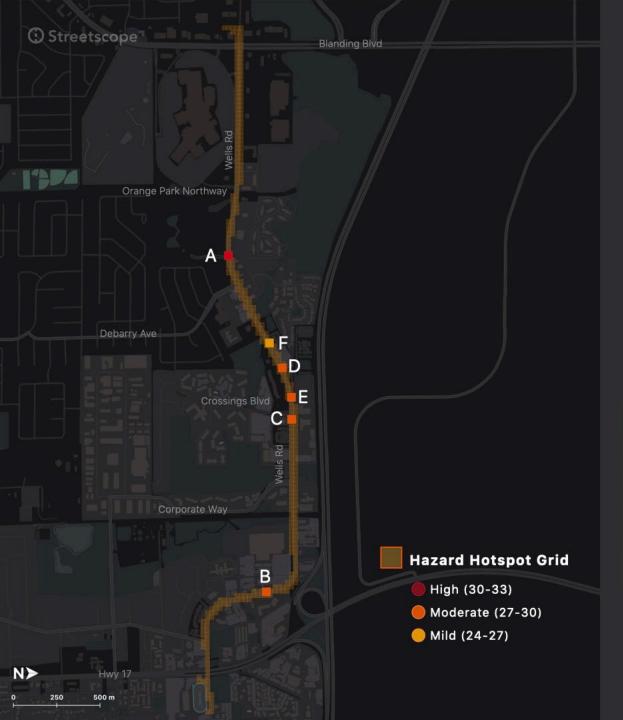

Pedestrian Activities to expect on the route:

- The point cluster map shows the distinct pedestrian counts for the entire duration of data collection.
- As expected, pedestrian activities are dominant near major intersections on the route.

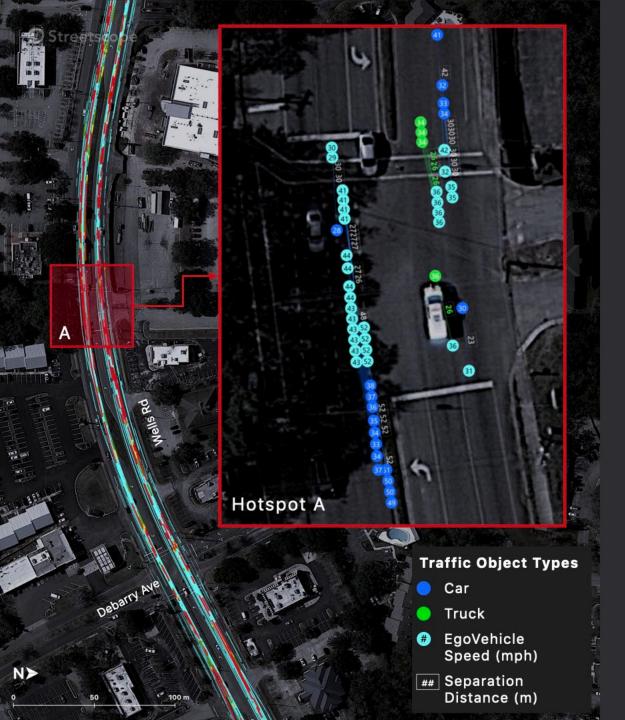

WELLS ROAD ROUTE - HAZARD HOTSPOTS ANALYSIS

Hotspot A is located at the junction of Wells Road and the Victoria Apartment Homes Intersection.

Hotspot A Characteristics:

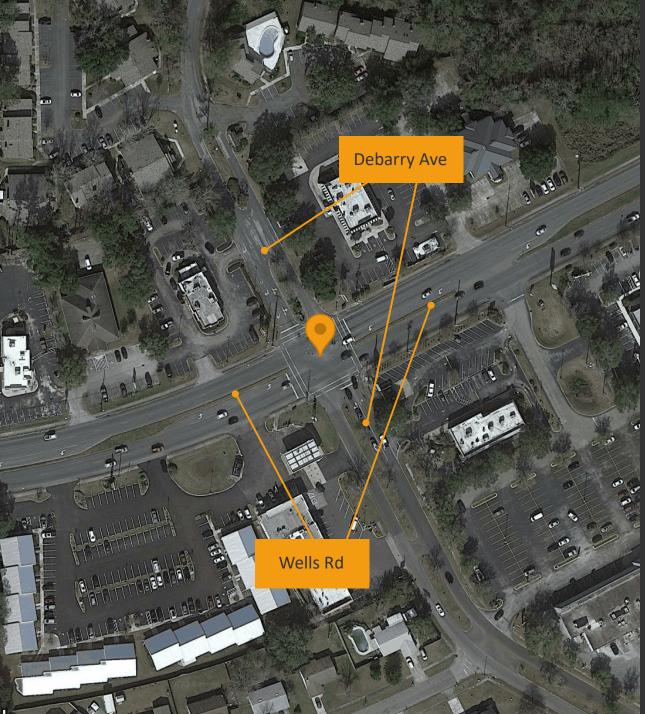
- Hazardous interactions are encountered due to close tailgating interactions and sudden lane changes to avoid decelerating traffic.
- While traveling east bound, traffic objects rapidly decelerate while approaching this junction either to stop for the red light or turn left at the Debarry Avenue intersection just ahead.
- Due to the curved geometry, drivers have limited visibility of the traffic lights at Debarry Avenue and quickly start decelerating or accelerating when they have a clear sight from Hotspot A (dilemma zone).
- While traveling west bound, traffic objects accelerate to cruising speeds after crossing the Debarry Avenue junction, but get in to close tailgating interactions caused by the disruption of traffic flow as vehicles abruptly slow down to access the shopping malls.

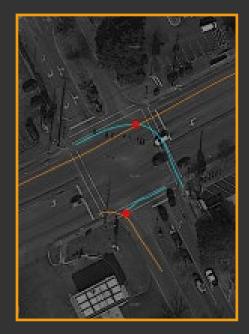

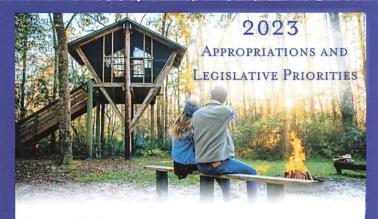

The TRIM process is governed by Florida Statute and is commonly referred to as Truth in Millage. It sets forth specific guidelines for the calculation and adoption of the millage rate and the annual budget of the County and its dependent districts.

Two public hearings are required to adopt a millage rate and budget. This is the second public hearing and was advertised September 21, 2023 in the newspaper Clay Today.

The TRIM process requires that the first substantive issue discussed shall be the percentage increase in millage over the rolled-back rate necessary to fund the budget and the purposes for which ad valorem tax revenues are increased over the rolled-back rate.

3. In keeping with the requirements of the TRIM process, the <u>County Manager</u> makes the following announcement:

The Fiscal Year 2023-2024 aggregate operating millage rate is 8.3661 mills which is more than the current year aggregate rolled-back rate of 7.4676 mills by 12.03%.

The proposed operating millage rates are broken down as follows:

Unincorporated Services MSTU Fund	0.1477 mills

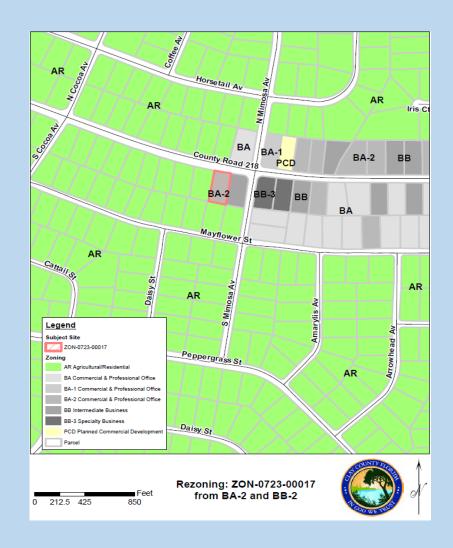

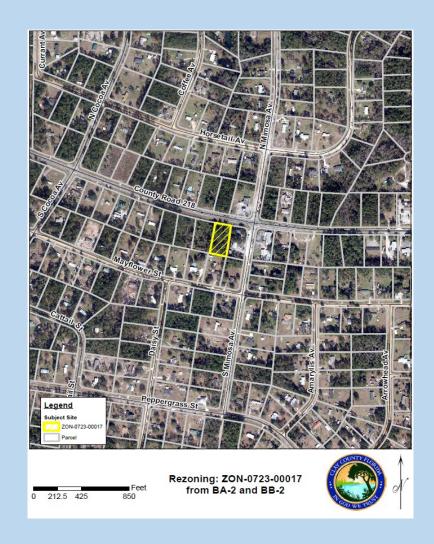
Property immediately to the east is zoned BB. South and west of the parcel is property zoned AR and north across C.R. 218 are properties zoned AR and BA.
